-PAST SIMPLE ·

We use the Past Simple for shorter, completed actions. The actions normally push the story forward and contain the action.

E.g.

A giant dragon flew into Hospitalet and decided that everyone was friendly, so it took off again.

-PAST CONTINUOUS -

Past Continuous refers to a continuing action or state that was happening at some point in the past, unfinished. We use it to set the scene and describe background information.

E.g.

I was kicking a football down the street in Sant Eulalia. A car was playing music and an old man was sitting on a bench, drinking coffee and whistling.

-PAST PERFECT

We use the Past Perfect when we are talking about the past and we want to talk about something that happened before this time. THINK: The past before the past! Había salido, había hecho etc. We can also use it for flashbacks.

E.g.

When I arrived at the party, Maria had already left.

PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS

We use this to show that an action started in the past and continued up to another point in the past.

E.g.

I had been waiting for two hours before Xavi finally arrived.

Hazy:

If your memory of something isn't clear (brumoso).



Bloodshot eyes:

When your eyes are red because of crying, drinking, hay fever etc.



Guilty conscience:

When you feel bad because of how you acted.



Hungover:

To feel ill because of excessive drinking.



Piece together:

Like a jigsaw. To look for clues to create a bigger picture.
